Before joining the IBEW-NECA apprenticeship program, Joseph Slayton struggled with substance abuse. Fed up with being, unemployed, poor, disconnected from his family, and intermittently homeless, he turned to the Vietnam Veterans of San Diego in 2001. The group referred him to a Building Trades pre-apprenticeship program. Today, Joseph is a journey-level electrician. He and his wife Diane, a registered nurse, are homeowners in Cardiff-by-the-Sea and proud parents of 7-month Joseph Alexander III. In the pre-apprenticeship program, Joseph was inspired by Sam Bass, an instructor, electrician, and long-time leader in IBEW 569. Today, Joseph credits his electrical industry career to helping him stay clean and sober and notes his top priorities are being a good husband and father.

Nicholas Segura, Jr.: Elected Union Leader and Navy Veteran



When Nicholas Segura Jr. transitioned from active duty in the Navy to civilian life, he worked without a union. Seeking a voice at work, Nicholas organized into the IBEW and in 1997 and entered the IBEW-NECA Electrical Apprenticeship.
